Sussex Police met the challenges of the last year in the best traditions of policing by consent, with a reassuring presence in our towns, our rural communities and on our roads.



Despite Covid-19, the force recruited more police officers and PCSOs, dramatically improved contact handling and has now established the largest Rural Crime Team in the South East. In January, a Sussex-wide Enforcement Unit was launched with enhanced specialist skills to tackle County Lines and disrupt the most dangerous crime gangs.

Your precept contributions have helped build a visible and reassuring policing presence that you say has improved your confidence.

The impact of the Coronavirus means we must use existing resources efficiently to sustain our momentum. New technology will reduce time spent managing information and maximise frontline and public-facing opportunities.

Tougher crackdowns on serious organised crime

The specially trained and equipped Tactical Enforcement Units are focused on closing down County Lines and removing the most dangerous criminals from the streets of Sussex.

Sussex Police's specialised Rural Crime Team

This new unit - the largest in the South East - has been set up to tackle criminal behaviour and support communities in more isolated parts of our county.
